Section 8-13-1120, SC Code Ann., 1976, as amended, requires certain officials to file a Statement of Economic Interests prior to assuming the duties of the office, and Section 8-13-1140, SC Code Ann., 1976, as amended, requires the filing of an updated Statement of Economic Interests for the previous calendar year annually thereafter prior to March 30. Records in the State Ethics Commission indicate that the Respondent was required to file the 2018 Statement of Economic Interests prior to taking the position in July 2018 and the 2021 Statement of Economic Interests.

Respondent was reminded of the filing requirement by a certified letter dated February 4, 2022 as described in the attached. To date, a 2018 Statement of Economic Interests has not been received. All in violation of Section 8-13-1120, SC Code Ann., 1976, as amended.

If there is a finding of probable cause, the following documents become public record: the complaint, the response (if any) by respondent, and the notice of hearing. If a hearing is to be held, the final order and all exhibits become public record. If no hearing is held following a finding of probable cause, the final disposition of the matter becomes public record.

The State Ethics Commission has determined that there is probable cause pursuant to Section 8-13-320(10)(i), Code of Laws, South Carolina, 1976, as amended, to support the allegations made in the above-captioned complaint. The Commission will convene a formal hearing into the matter in accordance with Section 8-13-320(10)(i) & (j), Code of Laws, South Carolina, 1976, as amended, and State Ethics Commission Regulations, S.C. Code Ann. Regs. 52-707 (1997 Cum. Supp.) on Thursday, December 15, 2022 at 9:30 a.m. at the Commission Hearing Room located at: 201 Executive Center Drive, Suite 150, Columbia, South Carolina 29210.

The following allegation will be heard:

COUNT ONE
FAILURE TO FILE STATEMENT OF ECONOMIC INTERESTS
SECTION 8-13-1110, S.C. CODE ANN., 1976, AS AMENDED

That James G. Jones, Sr., former Director of Consumer Services with Department of Vocational Rehabilitation, did in Richland County, fail to file a 2018 Statement of Economic Interests upon assuming his role as Director, in violation of Section 8-13-1110.

You have the right to be represented by counsel, the right to call and examine witnesses, the right to introduce exhibits, and the right to cross-examine opposing witnesses. This hearing will be open to the public as required by Section 8-13-320(10)(j), Code of Laws, South Carolina,

1976, as amended. The procedures to be followed are set forth in the Administrative Procedures Act, Section 1-23-10, et seq., Code of Laws, South Carolina, 1976 as amended the State Ethics Act, Section 8-13-100, et seq., Code of Laws, South Carolina, 1976, as amended, and State Ethics Commission Regulations, S.C. Code Ann. Regs. 52-707 (1997 Cum. Supp.).

A pre-hearing conference may be scheduled prior to the hearing to allow exchange of witness lists and evidence, marking of exhibits, and disposition of motions or pleadings. In the event you fail to appear, judgment by default will be rendered against you. CONSENT ORDER

This matter comes before the State Ethics Commission (Commission) by way of a Complaint filed on June 15, 2022. Pursuant to Section 8-13-320(10)(i) of the South Carolina Ethics, Government Accountability, and Campaign Reform Act (Ethics Act), the Complaint against George M. Pullie, Jr. (Respondent) was considered by the Commission and probable cause was found to warrant an evidentiary hearing. Prior to the call of the case, Respondent agreed to entry of the following:

STATEMENTS OF FACT

1. At all times relevant, Respondent was a public employee serving as Director of Consumer Services with the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation (Department). Respondent assumed the position in July 2018 and remained until July 2020 when he was granted a transfer.
2. Respondent did not file a Statement of Economic Interests (SEI) prior to assuming his official duties as Director.
3. Respondent timely filed SEIs in 2019 and 2020.
4. In a February 4, 2022 certified letter, the Commission notified Respondent of his failure to timely file a SEI prior to assuming his official duties as Director.
5. According to the United States Postal Service, the certified letter was delivered to Respondent's address of record on February 8, 2022 at 8:28 a.m.

6. On February 18, 2022, late-filing penalties began to accrue at \$10 per day.
7. On February 28, 2022, late-filing penalties began accruing at \$100 per day.
8. Following contact from a Commission Investigator, Respondent filed his 2018 SEI on July 25, 2022. At the time Respondent came into compliance, he had accrued \$5,000 in late-filing penalties.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Based upon the Statements of Fact, the Commission concludes, as a matter of law:

1. At all times relevant, Respondent was a “public employee” pursuant to Section 8-13-100(25).

Therefore, the Commission has personal and subject matter jurisdiction.

2. Section 8-13-1110 provides, in relevant part:

No public official, regardless of compensation, and no public member or public employee as designated in subsection (B) may take the oath of office or enter upon his official responsibilities unless he has filed a statement of economic interests in accordance with the provisions of this chapter with the appropriate supervisory office. If a public official, public member, or public employee referred to in this section has no economic interests to disclose, he shall nevertheless file a statement of inactivity to that effect with the appropriate supervisory office. All disclosure statements are matters of public record open to inspection upon request.

3. Section 8-13-1510(A) provides:

Except as otherwise specifically provided in this chapter, a person required to file a report or statement under this chapter who files a late statement or report or fails to file a required statement or report must be assessed a civil penalty as follows: (1) a fine of one hundred dollars if the statement or report is not filed within five days after the established deadline provided by law in this chapter; and (2) after notice has been given by certified or registered mail that a required statement or report has not been filed, a fine of ten dollars per calendar day for the first ten days after notice has been given, and one hundred dollars for each additional calendar day in which the required statement or report is not filed, not exceeding five thousand dollars.

4. Section 8-13-130 allows the Commission to “levy an enforcement or administrative fee on a person who is in violation” of the Ethics Act.

DISCUSSION

The Commission found probable cause to charge Respondent with one (1) count of violating Section 8-13-1110 for failing to timely file his 2018 SEI upon assuming his official duties. Through this Consent Order, Respondent acknowledges he violated the Ethics Act when he failed to timely file the required SEI. As mitigation, Respondent states he was not informed of the filing requirement when he was hired by the Department. Respondent states the Department advised him he was required to file a SEI in early 2019, at which time he complied. Respondent was unaware that he should have filed when he began the position. Respondent further states that he did not respond to the Commission's February 2022 letter because he believed he was already in compliance at that time.

DISPOSITION

1. The Commission hereby finds Respondent in violation of one (1) count of Section 8-13-1110.
2. The Commission hereby adopts the Statements of Fact, Conclusions of Law, Discussion, and Disposition as agreed upon by the Respondent.

THEREFORE, the Commission hereby issues a written warning and orders the Respondent to pay the Commission, within thirty (30) days from receipt of this Order, a late-filing penalty of \$100 and an administrative fee of \$350, for a total of \$450.

By executing this Consent Order, Respondent understands that he is not only admitting to violations of the Ethics Act, but also confessing to a judgment of \$450 (less any money paid to the Commission) in the event he does not make full and timely payment as provided for in this Order. In that event, the Commission shall file a Judgment against Respondent in the Clerk of Court's Office in the County of Respondent's last known residence. Upon said filing, the Clerk shall enter

this Order in the amount of \$450 (less any money paid to the Commission) in its Judgment Rolls,
without cost to the Commission.
