Section 8-13-1308, S.C. Code Ann., 1976, as amended, requires candidates to file Campaign Disclosures within ten (10) days of receiving or expending \$500; fifteen (15) days prior to each election; within ten (10) days of the end of each quarter; and a final report when the campaign account is closed. In addition, certified campaign reports detailing campaign contributions and expenditures must contain the total of contributions accepted, the name and address of each person making a contribution, the total expenditures made by or on behalf of the candidate or committee, and the name and address of each person to whom an expenditure is made from campaign funds. Pursuant to Section 8-13-1362 and Regulation 52-504 (C), the Pre-Election and quarterly report are required even when there have been no contributions or expenditures.

Records of the State Ethics Commission indicate that a Pre-Election Campaign Disclosure was due between October 13, 2021 and October 18, 2021.

Respondent was reminded of the filing requirement by a certified letter dated March 21, 2022 as described in the attached. To date, a properly completed Pre-Election Campaign Disclosure has not been received. All in violation of Section 8-13-1308(A), Section 8-13-1308 (D)(1), and Section 8-13-1308 (F), S.C. Code Ann., 1976, as amended.

If there is a finding of probable cause, the following documents become public record: the complaint, the response (if any) by respondent, and the notice of hearing. If a hearing is to be held, the final order and all exhibits become public record. If no hearing is held following a finding of probable cause, the final disposition of the matter becomes public record.

NOTICE OF HEARING

The State Ethics Commission has determined that there is probable cause pursuant to Section 8-13-320(10)(i), Code of Laws, South Carolina, 1976, as amended, to support the allegations made in the above-captioned complaint. The Commission will convene a formal hearing into the matter in accordance with Section 8-13-320(10)(i) & (j), Code of Laws, South Carolina, 1976, as amended, and State Ethics Commission Regulations, S.C. Code Ann. Regs. 52-707 (1997 Cum. Supp.) on Thursday, April 20, 2023 at 9:30 a.m. at the Commission Hearing Room located at: 201 Executive Center Drive, Suite 150, Columbia, South Carolina 29210.

The following allegation will be heard:

COUNT ONE
FAILURE TO FILE A PRE-ELECTION CAMPAIGN DISCLOSURE REPORT
SECTION 8-13-1308(A), S.C. CODE ANN., 1976, AS AMENDED

That Glynda V. Bryson, Abbeville County School District Trustee, did in Richland County, fail to file a 2021 Pre-Election Campaign Disclosure Report, in violation of Section 8-13-1308(A).

You have the right to be represented by counsel, the right to call and examine witnesses, the right to introduce exhibits, and the right to cross-examine opposing witnesses. This hearing will be open to the public as required by Section 8-13-320(10)(j), Code of Laws, South Carolina, 1976, as amended. The procedures to be followed are set forth in the Administrative Procedures

Act, Section 1-23-10, et seq., Code of Laws, South Carolina, 1976 as amended the State Ethics Act, Section 8-13-100, et seq., Code of Laws, South Carolina, 1976, as amended, and State Ethics Commission Regulations, S.C. Code Ann. Regs. 52-707 (1997 Cum. Supp.).

A pre-hearing conference may be scheduled prior to the hearing to allow exchange of witness lists and evidence, marking of exhibits, and disposition of motions or pleadings. In the event you fail to appear, judgment by default will be rendered against you. CONSENT ORDER

This matter comes before the State Ethics Commission (Commission) by way of a Complaint filed on November 21, 2022. Pursuant to Section 8-13-320(10)(i) of the South Carolina Ethics, Government Accountability, and Campaign Reform Act (Ethics Act), the complaint against Glynda V. Bryson (Respondent) was considered by the Commission and probable cause was found to warrant an evidentiary hearing on one (1) violation of Section 8-13-1308(A) for failing to file a 2021 Pre-Election Campaign Disclosure Report (CDR). Prior to the call of the case, Respondent agreed to the following:

STATEMENTS OF FACT

1. Respondent was elected to the Abbeville County School District (District) Board of Trustees (Board) in a November 2, 2021 election and took the oath of office on November 9, 2021. Respondent resigned from the Board in January 2023.
2. Respondent did not file a Pre-Election CDR before the November 2, 2021 election.
3. In March 2022, a Board member of a nearby school district advised Respondent of the requirement to file an annual Statement of Economic Interests (SEI).
4. On March 17, 2022, Respondent contacted Lessie Cheeseboro in the Commission's Disclosure Division. Ms. Cheeseboro assisted Respondent in setting up her account and in filing her 2021 and 2022 SEIs.
5. In a March 21, 2022 certified letter, the Commission notified Respondent of her failure to file a

2021 Pre-Election CDR.¹ The letter assessed a \$100 late-filing penalty and advised Respondent that additional late-filing penalties would accrue and a complaint would be filed if she failed to file a 2021 Pre-Election CDR.

6. According to the United States Postal Service, Respondent signed for the letter at the Post Office on March 24, 2022 at 12:00 p.m.
7. On April 3, 2022, late-filing penalties began to accrue at \$10 per day.
8. On April 13, 2022, late-filing penalties began to accrue at \$100 per day.
9. Following the filing of the Complaint, a Commission Investigator contacted Respondent and advised her that she was not in compliance and needed to file a 2021 Pre-Election CDR. Respondent stated she was aware of the SEI requirement, but was unaware of the requirements related to campaign disclosures. Respondent stated she did not raise or spend funds for the election.
10. Respondent was transferred to the Disclosure Division and received assistance with filing a 2021 Pre-Election CDR on December 13, 2022. At the time she came into compliance, Respondent had accrued \$5,000 in late-filing penalties pursuant to Section 8-13-1510.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Based upon the Statements of Fact, the Commission concludes, as a matter of law:

1. At all times relevant, Respondent was a candidate pursuant to Section 8-13-1300(4). Therefore, the Commission has personal and subject matter jurisdiction.
2. Section 8-13-1308(A) provides, in relevant part:

. . . a candidate who does not receive or expend campaign contributions totaling an accumulated aggregate of five hundred dollars or more must file an initial certified campaign report fifteen days before an election.

¹ This letter also notified Respondent that she had not timely filed her 2021 SEI. Respondent was assessed a \$100 late-filing penalty for the 2021 SEI. This late-filing penalty was handled through the Commission's regular non-compliance process and is not a part of this Complaint.

3. Section 8-13-1510(A) provides, in relevant part:

. . . a person required to file a report or statement under this chapter who files a late statement or report . . . must be assessed a civil penalty as follows: (1) a fine of one hundred dollars if the statement or report is not filed within five days after the established deadline provided by law in this chapter; and (2) after notice has been given by certified or registered mail that a required statement or report has not been filed, a fine of ten dollars per calendar day for the first ten days after notice has been given, and one hundred dollars for each additional calendar day in which the required statement or report is not filed, not exceeding five thousand dollars.

4. Section 8-13-130 allows the Commission to “levy an enforcement or administrative fee on a person who is in violation” of the Ethics Act.

DISCUSSION

The Commission found probable cause to charge Respondent with one (1) count of violating Section 8-13-1308(A) for failing to timely file a 2021 Pre-Election CDR. Through this Consent Order, Respondent admits she failed to timely file a 2021 Pre-Election CDR. In mitigation, Respondent states 2021 was her first run for public office. Respondent further states that she was unaware that she was required to file anything with the Commission until a Board member from another school district told her. Respondent states that she did not understand the difference between a SEI and a CDR and believed she was in compliance when she called Ms. Cheeseboro and received assistance with filing her SEIs on March 17, 2022. Respondent also states that when she received the Commission’s March 21, 2022 correspondence, she incorrectly assumed that she had filed the necessary reports because she had received assistance with her filings just a few days prior to receiving the letter.

DISPOSITION

1. The Commission finds Respondent in violation of one (1) count of Section 8-13-1308(A).
2. The Commission adopts the Statements of Fact, Conclusions of Law, Discussion, and Disposition as agreed upon by the Respondent.

THEREFORE, the Commission hereby issues this written warning to Respondent, and orders Respondent to pay the Commission, within six (6) months from receipt of this Order, a late-filing

penalty of \$300 and an administrative fee of \$300, for a total of \$600. The Commission declines to assess the remaining \$4,700 in accrued late-filing penalties.

By executing this Consent Order, Respondent understands that she is not only admitting to a violation of the Ethics Act, but also confessing to a judgment of \$600 in the event she does not make payment as provided for in this Order, in which case the Commission shall file a Judgment against Respondent with the County Clerk of Court in Respondent's last known County of residence, who shall enter this Order in the amount of \$600 (less any money paid) in its Judgment Rolls, without cost to the Commission.
